Letter from the President and Chair of the Board

Your commitment and generosity touched countless lives in 2009, a year when people around the world have struggled to recover from the global financial crisis.

Episcopal Relief & Development is grateful for your continued partnership and faith in our mission. Through your support, our work with Anglican and ecumenical partners has had a direct effect on the lives of an unprecedented 5.9 million people living in 46 countries.

Here are a few examples of the many lives you have helped to impact worldwide:

- Nam, a widow and mother of three living in Myanmar/Burma, doubled her yearly rice harvest with the help of a pair of buffalo from her local buffalo bank, helping her to take care of her family's basic needs and still have rice left over to sell at the market:
- Juana, an 11-year-old girl from the Dominican Republic, became a peer health advocate, talking to her friends and neighbors about how clean water and good hand-washing can help prevent disease;
- The people of Ambigaw, a mountain village in the Philippines, built a fruit-processing plant and an ingenious tram system that allows them to transport their produce to market; and
- People affected by the ongoing civil conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo received critical aid and support for peace-building and economic rehabilitation.

Our work is guided by Jesus' exhortation in Matthew 25 to care for our neighbors in need. In response to this call, Episcopal

Relief & Development and its partners have been striving to ensure that more women become economically and socially empowered, more children live past their first year, more families have access to clean, safe water, and more communities rebuild and recover from disasters.



Program Impact and Focus Areas

ALLEVIATING HUNGER AND IMPROVING FOOD **SUPPLY**

Nam, a widow and mother of three living in Myanmar/ Burma, is one of the 766,499 people in 29 countries who have bettered their lives through Episcopal Relief & Development's programs to alleviate hunger and improve food supply. By participating in a local buffalo bank run in partnership with the Church of the Province of Myanmar, Nam has been able to double her yearly rice harvest. Now, she can easily feed her family, pay the rent and give back to the community—gifting two of her buffaloes' offspring back to the community bank for distribution to one of her neighbors. She is part of a virtuous cycle of giving that will enable an entire community to lift itself out of poverty.



In partnership with local churches and ecumenical agencies, Episcopal Relief & Development is moving communities from sickness to strength by:

- Training health workers to educate their communities about disease prevention
- Building wells, latrines, water stations and other systems to promote sanitation and prevent waterborne diseases
- Distributing insecticide-treated nets and educating communities about malaria prevention
- Providing immunizations and medicine through local and mobile clinics
- Offering maternal and child health programs
- Delivering health care and education to children who have lost their parents to HIV/AIDS

Program Impact and Focus Areas

PROMOTING HEALTH AND FIGHTING DISEASE

Juana, an 11-year-old girl from the Dominican Republic, is one of thousands of local health workers in 34 countries who partner with Episcopal Relief & Development to promote health and fight disease, transforming the lives of over 5.8 million people. Juana is the youngest volunteer health promoter receiving training from the Clinica Esperanza y Caridad clinic in the city of San Pedro de Macoris. Communicating health information on a "kidto-kid" basis, she is reaching younger members of her community and teaching them how to prevent disease through drinking only clean water and practicing good handwashing and other basic hygiene. Adult volunteers, like Juana's mother, can receive specialized training that helps to reduce child mortality, improve maternal health, and support local community members in living healthier lives.



CREATING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES AND STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES

The people of Ambigaw, an isolated mountain village in the Philippines, represent just a few of the 709,609 people in 28 countries whose lives have been changed through Episcopal Relief & Development's efforts to create economic opportunities and strengthen communities. Through an integrated development project operated in partnership with the Episcopal Church in the Philippines, the community has built a fruit-processing plant and installed a tram, which enables them to more easily transport their wares to market. This has generated income for the entire community.



In partnership with local churches and ecumenical agencies, Episcopal Relief & Development is supporting people in the journey from poverty to prosperity by:

- Helping people develop small businesses in a variety of fields
- Assisting communities in gaining access to local markets, increasing their ability to sell products for profit
- Providing micro-finance opportunities that enable people to generate more income
- Promoting cooperatives to help people pool their resources and maximize their purchasing power
- Working with farming communities to increase their crop yield so that the surplus can be sold for income



In partnership with local churches and ecumenical agencies, Episcopal Relief & Development is taking communities from adversity to advantage by:

- Working with the local churches and ecumenical partners to provide life-saving assistance such as food, water, shelter, medicine and other essential supplies, as well as trauma counseling and psychosocial services for survivors
- Conducting needs assessments in affected communities to create long-term recovery plans
- Remaining with communities and assisting in rebuilding homes, schools, clinics and other civic structures
- Restoring the social and economic fabric of communities by supporting small business development and creating income-generating opportunities
- Working domestically to develop disasterpreparedness programs in collaboration with Episcopal dioceses around the country

Program Impact and **Focus Areas**

RESPONDING TO DISASTERS AND REBUILDING COMMUNITIES

People impacted by ongoing civil conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo are among the 100,071 people in 16 countries whose lives have been touched by Episcopal Relief & Development's programs that respond to disasters and rebuild communities. In addition to providing critical aid for those who have been forced to leave their homes because of violent conflict, the agency is working with three provinces of the Anglican Church of the Congo to create peace-building and reconciliation programs and provide economic opportunities to those made most vulnerable by this crisis.

At Episcopal Relief & Development, we use all financial contributions in the most effective ways possible to serve and support people who are suffering worldwide.


Episcopal Relief & Development spent 85% on programs versus 5% on administration and 10% on fundraising in 2009. Additional support for organizational expenditures is provided through contributed services from the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society and income from investments.

Episcopal Relief & Development meets all 20 standards of the Better Business Bureau. In addition to maintaining the highest standards for internal accountability, the organization is involved in multi-agency efforts to improve practices and reporting within the relief and development community.
